SCRIPTURE READING JOSHUA 4:4-7



Remembering Sacrifice, Living with Hope

Scripture Reading - Joshua 4:4-7

Memorial Day reminds us that remembering is holy. In this passage from Joshua, God commands His people to gather stones from the riverbed as a lasting memorial—so future generations will know the story of what God has done. As we honor those who gave their lives for the sake of others, this reading calls us to remember with purpose, gratitude, and hope.

Joshua 4:4-7

⁴ So Joshua called together the twelve men he had appointed from the Israelites, one from each tribe, ⁵ and said to them, "Go over before the ark of the LORD your God into the middle of the Jordan. Each of you is to take up a stone on his shoulder, according to the number of the

tribes of the Israelites, ⁶ to serve as a sign among you. In the future, when your children ask you, 'What do these stones mean?' ⁷ tell them that the flow of the Jordan was cut off before the ark of the covenant of the LORD. When it crossed the Jordan, the waters of the Jordan were cut off. These stones are to be a memorial to the people of Israel forever."

John 15:12-13

¹² My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you. ¹³ Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends.

2 Timothy 4:7-8

⁷ I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. 8 Now there is in store for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day—and not only to me, but also to all who have longed for his appearing.

Sermon Insights

Sermon Lesson:

In Joshua 4, God instructs His people to take stones from the Jordan River and set them up as a memorial—so that future generations would never forget what God had done for them. Memorial Day invites us into a similar kind of remembering. We pause to honor those who laid down their lives in service to others, and like the Israelites, we mark their sacrifice not only with gratitude, but with commitment—to carry forward their legacy with lives that honor courage, freedom, and faithfulness.

Application:

1. Let someone else's burden become your mission.

Love isn't a feeling—it's a choice to carry what isn't ours. This week, look for someone who's carrying something heavy—and step in. That's greater love.

2. Don't wait for a moment to matter—make one.

Don't wait to make peace. Don't wait to forgive. Don't wait to serve. Memorial Day reminds us how quickly moments pass. Step into your calling now.

3. Let your hope interrupt someone else's despair.

You never know who's hanging on by a thread. A steady faith, a kind word, or a prayer can speak volumes. Be someone's reminder that God is still at work.

Conclusion:

As we remember the lives laid down for our nation, we also remember the deeper calling God places on each of us—to live with gratitude, to love with sacrifice, and to walk forward in hope. Memorial Day is not just about honoring the past, but about how we live in the present. Just as the stones in Joshua's time told
