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The Gift of the Holy Spirit

John 20:19–31 takes us into one of the most tender and powerful moments after Jesus' resurrection. The disciples are locked away in fear, uncertain of what the future holds, when Jesus Himself suddenly stands among them—offering peace, showing His scars, and breathing the Holy Spirit into their lives. In this passage, we witness not only the reality of the risen Christ, but also the beginning of a new kind of relationship with God: one marked by His Spirit living within us. It's a story of peace replacing fear, faith overcoming doubt, and God's presence stepping straight into our locked rooms and our wounded hearts.

Scripture Reading: John 20:19-31 (NIV)

Jesus Appears to His Disciples

¹⁹ On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jewish leaders, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" ²⁰ After he said this, he showed them his hands and side. The disciples were overjoyed when they saw the Lord.

²¹ Again Jesus said, "Peace be with you! As the Father has sent me, I am sending you." ²² And with that he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³ If you forgive anyone's sins, their sins are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven."

Jesus Appears to Thomas

²⁴ Now Thomas (also known as Didymus), one of the Twelve, was not with the disciples when Jesus came. ²⁵ So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord!"

But he said to them, "Unless I see the nail marks in his hands and put my finger where the nails were, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe."

²⁶ A week later his disciples were in the house again, and Thomas was with them. Though the doors were locked, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" ²⁷ Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here; see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Stop doubting and believe."

²⁸ Thomas said to him, "My Lord and my God!"

²⁹ Then Jesus told him, "Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed."

The Purpose of John's Gospel

³⁰ Jesus performed many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not recorded in this book. ³¹ But these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name.

Interesting Facts about John 20:19–31

• The doors were locked — yet Jesus entered without opening them, showing His resurrected body is physical but no longer bound by ordinary limits.

• Jesus says "Peace be with you" three times emphasizing that peace is His gift to fearful, doubting hearts, not something they had to achieve themselves.

• Jesus breathes on the disciples — mirroring Genesis 2:7 when God breathed life into Adam. This symbolizes **new** spiritual life through the Holy Spirit.

• This is the first time the disciples are sent — Jesus commissions them ("As the Father has sent me, I am sending you") even *before* Pentecost.



•The phrase "Receive the Holy Spirit" is unique here — it's a personal, quiet empowerment compared to the public outpouring at Pentecost (Acts 2).

•**Thomas is the only disciple singled out for missing the first encounter** — giving rise to the phrase "Doubting Thomas," though his story is ultimately one of **bold confession**, not failure.

•Thomas' confession ("My Lord and my God!") is the strongest personal statement of Jesus' divinity found anywhere in the Gospels.

•Jesus meets Thomas' doubt with grace, not rebuke — showing that honest questions are not barriers to faith, but can become doorways to deeper belief.

•The blessing extends to us — When Jesus says, "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed," He is directly speaking about future generations of believers—including us today.

•John 20:30–31 is the original "purpose statement" of the Gospel of John — John clearly says he wrote these stories so that you may believe and have life in Jesus' name.

How John 20:19–31 Ties into the Old Testament

1. Breathing the Spirit — Creation Echo (Genesis 2:7)

- In Genesis, God breathed physical life into Adam.
- In John 20, Jesus breathes spiritual life into His disciples. 2 This shows Jesus as the New Adam, bringing a new creation through the Spirit.

2. Peace to the Fearful — God's Covenant Promise (Numbers 6:24–26)

- God's blessing over Israel was peace: "The Lord lift up His countenance upon you and give you peace."
- Jesus' repeated words, "Peace be with you," fulfill God's desire for His people to live in His peace, not fear.

3. Sending After Receiving — The Mission of God's People (Isaiah 6:8)

- When Isaiah encountered God, he was forgiven and then sent: "Here am I, send me."
- Similarly, Jesus breathes new life into His disciples and immediately commissions them: "As the Father has sent me, I am sending you."

4. Proof of Resurrection — Scars and Signs (Psalm 22, Isaiah 53)

- The Old Testament foretold the Messiah would suffer (Psalm 22:16-18; Isaiah 53:5).
- Jesus showing His wounds fulfills these prophecies—He is the Suffering Servant who now stands alive.
- 5. Doubting and Believing Pattern of Israel (Exodus 4, Numbers 14)
 - Thomas' doubt mirrors Israel's struggles to trust God even after miracles.
 - Just as God patiently pursued Israel, Jesus patiently meets Thomas—inviting faith even after doubt.

6. Blessed Without Seeing — Faith Foretold (Habakkuk 2:4)

- "The righteous will live by faith."
- Jesus blesses those who believe without seeing, fulfilling the Old Testament truth that faith—not sight—is the basis of righteousness.

7. Witnessing Life — New Covenant Promise (Jeremiah 31:33)

- God promised in Jeremiah to write His law on people's hearts.
- The giving of the Holy Spirit begins this inner work—transforming hearts from within, not just guiding them by external laws.

Sermon Insights

Sermon Lesson:

Even behind locked doors, Jesus comes. In John 20:19–31, we see the risen Christ step into fear-filled rooms, offer His peace, show His scars, and breathe His Spirit into broken hearts. He meets the doubters without shame and sends the fearful out with purpose. This passage reminds us that faith isn't about having it all together—it's about receiving the living presence of Jesus, even when we're uncertain. Through the Holy Spirit, God moves from being beside us to living within us, empowering us to walk in peace, to believe without seeing, and to carry His light into a fearful world.

Application:

- Let Jesus into your locked places. No fear, failure, or doubt is too great for Christ to enter. Invite Him into the areas of your life you've hidden away—and receive His peace.
- Trust the Spirit who lives within you. The Holy Spirit isn't a distant helper; He is God's presence in you. Rely on His strength daily, especially when you feel weak, afraid, or uncertain.
- Carry peace and purpose into the world. Just as Jesus sent the disciples, He sends you. Go into your everyday world—with your scars, your story, and His Spirit—to be a witness of His love and life.

Conclusion:

Even today, Jesus still comes to locked rooms and fearful hearts. He still speaks peace, shows His love, and breathes His Spirit into His people. No matter where you find yourself—doubting like Thomas, hiding like the disciples, or longing for more—Jesus stands before you with open hands and an open invitation. Receive His peace. Trust His Spirit within you. And go—sent into the world not in fear, but in the unstoppable power of the risen Christ.
