

Let Your Light Shine: Faith That Serves the Community

In *Matthew 5:14–16*, Jesus says, *"You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden."* These words challenge us to live visibly and boldly in our faith—not hiding it, but allowing God's light to shine through our actions.

### Interesting Facts About Matthew 5:14–16

### 1. Jesus Uses Everyday Imagery

Jesus chose two very ordinary images—a city on a hill and a lamp on a stand—to explain something extraordinary. These were common sights for His listeners. The "city on a hill" likely referred to a visible town like Safed, a well-known elevated city in Galilee that could be seen from miles away. A lamp in the home was the only source of light at night. These images made His message clear and relatable.

### 2. He Doesn't Say "Be the Light"—He Says "You Are"

Jesus doesn't command His followers to become light. He declares that they **already are** light. This isn't about earning status—it's about **identity**. As believers, we reflect God's presence just by living out who we truly are in Him.

### 3. It's the First Time Jesus Speaks About Influence

This passage is part of the **Sermon on the Mount**, Jesus' first major public teaching. Right after the Beatitudes, He launches into this passage about influence. He's essentially saying: *If you live the way I just described—merciful, pure in heart, peacemaking—you will naturally shine.* 

### 4. The Greek Word for "Good" Means Beautiful

When Jesus says, *"that they may see your good deeds,"* the Greek word for *good* is **kalos**, which also means *beautiful* or *noble*. It's not just about usefulness—it's about the kind of good that draws others in. Christ-followers are meant to live beautifully and attractively for God's glory.

### 5. It Echoes God's Mission in the Old Testament

This teaching fulfills a longstanding pattern in Scripture. In **Isaiah 42:6**, God says to Israel: *"I will make you a light for the nations."* Jesus continues that mission—passing the torch to His followers, calling them to live in a way that draws the world to God.

### 6. This Is One of the Roots of the Phrase "City on a Hill" in American History

The phrase "city on a hill" has been famously used in American political rhetoric—especially by John Winthrop and later **President Ronald Reagan**—to describe a moral example to the world. But its origin is deeply biblical, and its original context was about the church's witness, not national identity.

### 7. It's Not About Personal Glory

The passage ends with *"that they may glorify your Father in heaven."* The goal of shining light isn't self-promotion—it's **God-promotion**. Our good works aren't the destination; they're signs pointing people to the Source of light.

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### Sermon Insights

### Sermon Lesson:

Matthew 5:14–16 reminds us that our faith was never meant to be hidden—it was meant to shine. Jesus calls us the light of the world, not because of our perfection, but because of His presence within us. Just as a lamp gives light to everyone in the house, our everyday actions—kindness, service, honesty, encouragement—can light the way for others to see God. When we live with purpose and love, our lives become visible testimonies of God's grace. So whether you're volunteering in the community, helping a neighbor, or simply showing up with compassion, remember: your light matters, and someone may find their way to God because of it.

### **Application:**

### 1. Live Your Faith Publicly, Not Privately

Let your kindness, integrity, and love for others be visible in your everyday interactions. Whether at work, in your neighborhood, or on social media, choose to reflect Christ through your words and actions.

### 2. Serve Where You Are Planted

Just like a lamp lights up the room it's placed in, God has positioned you in your community for a reason. Look for small but meaningful ways to serve—volunteer, encourage someone, or support a local effort like the Ruritan Club.

### 3. Point Glory Back to God

When people notice the good in you, redirect the praise to the One who lit the flame. Let your life spark conversations that lead others to discover God's goodness, not just your own generosity.

#### Conclusion:

As we go out into the world this week, may we remember that we are not just called to believe—we are called to shine. Jesus has already placed His light within us, and now it's our turn to let it be seen. Whether through quiet acts of service, encouraging words, or simply showing up with love, your light has the power to guide, to comfort, and to glorify God. Don't underestimate what He can do through one life lit by His grace. So step boldly into your community, and let your light shine.
